Welcome to my monthly newsletter

My role as a district councillor is not limited to East Suffolk District council policies and responsibilities, but I continue to liaise / work with all our stakeholders – contacting our MP to assist with issues and now with Reform controlling the County Council highlight damaging policies and holding them to account.

Unfortunately, our reform council's first act was not focusing on highways, cost of living crisis or environment, but removing the Ukrainian flag /declaring reversal of environmental positive policies and reversing net zero and issuing a judicial review against UK govt on local government reorganisation. The leader has also declared he is spending 18,000 pounds on upgrading his office - if I had 18,000 pounds, I could replace all the road signs and repaint all the road markings and improve highways safety - this is about choice in spending taxpayers money - I will continue to lobby the county council to focus on our issues on the Peninsula and will highlight the policies which are not consistent to our values.

OPPOSITION AGAINST SCC USING TAX PAYERS MONEY ON CHALLENGING AGREED UNITARY COUNCIL

The discussion on unitary council took many months and a lot of council time and resources. Both the district council and previous administration at the county council concluded best way to offer unitary – one council for Suffolk or 3 separate councils. Finally, a public consultation took place and UK government then made a decision for best outcome for Suffolk.

Three councils agreed - better for residents and one councillor will cover all local government responsibilities, economies of scale and a better more efficient local democracy. Officers have started work on this outcome. Reform county council however now they are in power are opposed to unitary council and have declared a judicial review (J review are about process not outcome). I quickly highlighted this was a waste of taxpayers' money – costing minimum of 500k - funds which would help enormously to prepare and upgrade out highways on the peninsula . EAD picked up on this concern:

BAWDSEY QUAY - Vandalism

All no parking signs have been removed from Bawdsey Quay, we believe by camper vans who park over night with some staying for days and weeks. It is an ongoing battle with selfish individuals who block roads, the view and access to the river and ferry.

Signs are controlled by Reform County Council so we are waiting for these to be replaced - until replaced no enforcement can take place - which is very frustrating



ABANDONED CAR REMOVED AT SUTTON HOO / MELTON ROAD

I reported a car which had been parked for over a month at this junction – apart from being an eye sore - I was concerned perhaps something had happened to the owner. Various checks then illustrated car was untaxed with the owner living in Nottingham - not sure if the owner had the car removed or if it had been towed away - but car has now gone

EAST SUFFOLK FAILURE TO IMPLEMENT NEW WASTE COLLECTIONS – A TOTAL BIN-TASTROPHE

I am shocked at the failure of the Green party to implement a new waste collection service after two years of planning. This new “twin-stream” waste collection system has left thousands of local taxpayers facing missed collections, an influx of pests, and an unprecedented shortage of essential wheelie bins. This roll out has been plagued by operational failures on the Deben Peninsula and across East Suffolk.

The failure to collect food waste in particular is causing problems with vermin and even family pet cats and dogs eating the rotting food if the caddy is not locked. This has been compounded by the Green party decision to move the general waste collection to a three weekly schedule - (to point Ipswich is a twice a week collection)



For the record as previous chair of Suffolk waste partnership I repeatedly highlighted the problems we are likely to encounter - but I was ignored and the policy was designed behind closed doors with no cross-party involvement.

I continue to push for better focused services. I spoke out at full council although the chair tried to stop me asking my question.

Please ask residents who have had no collections since June or have had missed garden waste collections to contact me directly.

I am committed to be accessible and connected to all my villages and residents and recently had my summer surgery. It was well attended with main issues raised - planning, bins and highways

BROMESWELL OPEN GARDENS

Popped into Bromeswell Open gardens - lovely to see the back of houses – such amazing gardens – then finished with tea and cake by the church listening to a brass band - great way to spend a Sunday afternoon - met a number of supporters who thanked me for my hard work .

CORONATION AVENUE HOLLESLEY

After much negotiation and lobbying by myself I have arranged for entire resurfacing to take place end of July - this will greatly improve the road for residents and visitors alike

BAWDSEY BINS

When I was in charge of bins as cabinet member of the environment I spent much of my time micromanaging bins and frequency of collections in our tourist pinch points

Bawdsey Quay in particular is a sensitive area and the green party has now removed a couple of bins and changed the frequency of collection. I continue to push hard to have the old system reinstated - bins by water should be treated as a priority - any rubbish entering our water system is difficult to extract and is a danger to our marine biodiversity, not only this as it breaks down it also enters food chains which can eventually harm sea birds and humans.

I am pleased to see the missing bins have been replaced and recently collections have been on time

PRESS RELEASE ON COUNTRYSIDE FIRE PREVENTION

COUNCILLOR JAMES MALLINDER URGES VIGILANCE TO PROTECT DEBEN PENINSULA FROM COUNTRYSIDE FIRES

Councillor James Mallinder, representative for the Deben Ward at East Suffolk Council, is today issuing an urgent appeal to residents and visitors to practice extreme caution in order to prevent devastating wildfires across the Suffolk countryside. As dry weather conditions elevate the risk of crop and heathland blazes, Cllr Mallinder highlights the catastrophic long-term impacts these fires have on local biodiversity, rural economies, and community safety. A strong advocate for embedding environmental protection into public policy, he emphasizes that preventing countryside fires is a shared social responsibility.

Protecting Our Shared Environment

"Our unique landscapes, from the Deben peninsula to our local heathlands, are a haven for biodiversity, but they are incredibly vulnerable during dry spells," said Cllr James Mallinder. "We have seen firsthand how quickly a small spark can tear through hectares of tinder-dry crops, threatening homes, destroying wildlife habitats, and leaving scars on the landscape that take years to heal.

"A healthy environment means healthy communities. While our emergency services do a heroic job, the most effective tool we have against wildfires is prevention. I am calling on everyone enjoying our beautiful countryside to adhere strictly to the Countryside Code and take proactive measures to ensure a disaster is averted."

To minimize wildfire hazards, Cllr Mallinder and local environmental partners urge the public to follow these essential safety steps:

- **Ban disposable BBQs:** Never use disposable barbecues in public open spaces, forests, or near dry grass.
- **Pack a picnic:** Swap hot grills for packed lunches when visiting local nature reserves.
- **Dispose of cigarettes safely:** Ensure all stubs are entirely extinguished and never throw them from moving vehicles.
- **Take litter home:** Bottles and discarded glass can act as magnifying lenses, concentrating sunlight and triggering intense fires.
- **Report smoke immediately:** Dial 999 at the very first sign of fire to ensure emergency crews can contain it early.



The call for heightened awareness is also deeply tied to the safety and accessibility of rural infrastructure. In addition to environmental devastation, countryside fires jeopardize single-access village routes, creating severe health and safety risks for isolated residents.

By eliminating preventable fire hazards, residents can protect local farmland, safeguard vital emergency service resources, and preserve Suffolk's fragile ecosystems for generations to come.
